# More Children Succeeding in School

Third graders have higher standardized scores and lower special education placement rates

in those counties that had received relatively more funding for Smart Start when these children were younger. This is according to research released in March 2011 by Duke University, which found that investments in Smart Start generate broad education benefits.



# More Children Screened & Identified for Early Intervention



## Early Care Availability and Affordability

Provides financial assistance with child care costs for eligible families. Programs Funded: Child Care Subsidy and Subsidy Administration, and Quality Stars Program (QSP)

#### 64

Children (ages 0-5) receiving Smart Start child care subsidies out of a total of 325 children (ages 0-12) receiving subsidies

#### 263

Children impacted by additional supplements to 15 child care facilities participating in QSP and maintaining 4 and 5 star rating

#### program impact

97% of subsidized children were enrolled in regulated, licensed care. Of those, 97% are enrolled in 4 and 5 star facilities during 2020.



### Early Care and Education Quality

Improves the quality of care for young children in local child care facilities, Head Start Programs, public school and church preschools.

Programs Funded: Outreach Health-Child Care Health Consultant (CCHC), Child Care Services, Early Childhood Resource Center (ECRC), NC Pre-K Coordination, and WAGE\$

Child care facilities received technical assistance and training (CCS and Outreach Health)

#### program impact

There was a 14% turnover rate of Stanly county WAGE\$ participants compared to 25% for all child care providers statewide.
